

# Working For God

For many people, work is a part of everyday life. They get up, go to work (or school), come back home, go to sleep, and do it all over again the next day. It is the cycle of life. But did you know that from the beginning of Creation, God has always had a job for humans?

> In Genesis 2:15, "God took the man and put him in the Garden of Eden to tend and keep it." God made the garden so Adam would have a place to work. However, aside from God's direct command to tend to the garden, it seems that working is a part of God's nature, and humans can reflect His nature when they work actively and diligently (Proverbs 6:6-11). Despite the perfection of God's creation, when Adam and Eve broke the rules, the curse turned work from a pleasant task into a hardship of pain and suffering.

> > The New Testament also talks about working. Beginning in the gospel accounts, "work" and "worker" are used to describe the ministry of the Gospel. In the book of John, Jesus referred to Himself as doing the work of God (4:34), the work of healing (5:17), and the work of redemption (17:4). Paul also used such phrases as "worked very hard in the Lord" (Romans 16:12) and a "worker" to refer to Timothy, whose work consisted of correctly teaching the Truth.

> > > Today, we should want to follow in Paul's and Timothy's footsteps, working diligently for the Lord. Colossians 3:23-24 says that "whatever you do, do it heartily, as to the Lord and not to men, knowing that from the Lord you will receive the reward of inheritance; for you serve the Lord Christ." Both the Old Testament and New Testament teach that work brings a sense of joy, satisfaction, dignity, and respect. God's people are not only to put forth their best efforts to accomplish their tasks, but are also called upon to maintain the highest moral standards as they carry out their daily jobs.

Whether you are at school or doing your chores around the house, do your best-work hard!





In the Bible, we read about a group of people who wanted something very badly. The Israelites wanted to be free. They were forced to be slaves in the land of Egypt. God heard their prayers, and sent Moses and Aaron to bring them out of Egypt. The Israelites were very happy to be free. But their freedom was not as easy as they thought it would be. After God freed the Israelites, they began to murmur and complain against God and Moses.

In Exodus 16, we read that the Israelites started to get hungry. They began to complain, saying that they wished God had let them die in Egypt—at least they had food as Pharaoh's slaves. God heard their cries, and gave them a special food called manna. God gave them this bread from heaven for forty years while they lived in the wilderness. But after a while, the Israelites got tired of eating manna. They whined, "Who will give us meat to eat? We remember the fish which we ate freely in Egypt...but now our whole being is dried up; there is nothing at all except this manna before our eyes!" (Numbers 11:4-5).

On another occasion, the children of Israel spoke against God and Moses, blaming them for setting them free from Egypt. "Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness?," cried the people (Numbers 21:5). They kept mumbling and complaining, so God sent poisonous snakes among the people that bit them and killed many of them.

After looking at God's reaction to murmuring and complaining, we might think He was too hard on the Israelites. But the Israelites were questioning God's power and His promises to help them. Even in the New Testament, we read that we should, "do all things without murmuring and disputing" (Philippians 2:14). We also read that God dealt with the Israelites as He did in order to show us today how seriously God views griping and complaining (1 Corinthians 10:9-10). When we look at the life of Jesus, we see that He was tortured and punished for sins that He did not even commit. Yet, never once did He murmur or complain against God. Instead of complaining about the things we do not have, we should be thankful to God, like Jesus was, for the many wonderful things we do have. And always remember what happened to the grumbling, mumbling, griping, complaining Israelites. am the LORD your Go

Now, let's think about how we spend our time. Is it fun to get on the computer, play video games, read fun books, play basketball outside, or watch movies and TV? Sure it is. All these things are fun, and they can all be very good. But what would happen if you did too much of any of them? What would happen if you watched TV all the time? You would most likely do badly in school because you would be watch-

ing TV instead of doing your homework. Your body would lose muscle because you were not exercising, and your mind would not be sharp and clear to think about good things. Watching TV is not wrong, but spending too much time watching TV, without doing other good things, is.

In Ephesians 5:16, Paul wrote: "See then that you walk circumspectly, not as fools but as wise, redeeming the time, because the days are evil." To walk circumspectly means to be careful about how you spend your valuable time. This verse tells us that we should make sure to do important things like read the Bible, help other people, pray, and work hard for the Lord. Those who use all their time on other things are foolish, while the wise understand that time is short and there is much work to be done.

There are many good, fun things to do in this life. But we must remember that time is very valuable, and we need to make sure that we are "getting our work done" at home, at school, and for the Lord.



# On-line and Out of Touch with God?

Most homes in America now have at least one computer that is connected to the Internet and many young people get on-line. And why not? The Web provides almost limitless possibilities. On-line, you can learn (at <a href="www.discoverymaga-zine.com">www.discoverymaga-zine.com</a>, for instance), talk to friends, teach the Gospel, share pictures, and more. The Internet is a tool, and Christians may use it to carry out the will of God. Many people, even preachers, teach more lost souls by using the Internet than any other method.

However, the Internet is also dangerous. Those who serve the devil unleash evil images and dangerous ideas on the Internet every day. For this reason, we must be careful when we surf the Web (see Philippians 4:8). Make certain your parents know about the sites you visit. Your mom or dad may even install a filter to protect your family from ungodly content.

The Internet poses another danger. It may tempt us to waste time or become lazy. Instead of using the Internet to learn about God and His world, encourage others, build Christian relationships, sharpen our minds, teach the Gospel, or do important business, we may spend lots of time visiting Web sites that do little or no good for us or anybody. For example, it is wrong to spend long periods of time chatting with friends about insignificant things, when we fail to take interest in, or talk about, what is really important: service to God in His kingdom (2 Timothy 2:16).

Sadly, the devil uses great tools such as the Internet to keep people from "redeeming the time," or spending time doing things that will matter in eternity (Ephesians 5:16). Jesus told us to place the highest priority on the kingdom of God (Matthew 6:33). So, while surfing the Web is not wrong in itself, if we allow it to make us lazy or keep us from saving souls, then it is wrong.


## Dear Digger Doug,


